Dear Friends,

I'm writing a letter to all the Churches within our care (Auchtergaven and Moneydie lw Redgorton and Stanley) to reflect on the Presbytery Plan and the hope of Easter.

As you may well know the Presbytery has been asked to cut the number of centrally paid staff ie Ministers and Parish workers by 40%. This is a huge cut and change to the way we have organized the resources of the Kirk to be the National Church. The outcome of the proposal will see every parish within Perth Presbytery affected in some way or another. What it means for us is a grouping of Letham St Marks, Perth North and Perth Riverside and Auchtergaven and Moneydie lw Redgorton and Stanley. The resources given to each parish has been cut with Letham dropping to 1.7 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) and Auchtergaven and Moneydie lw Redgorton and Stanley dropping to 0.25 FTE. What that means is the equivalent of a paid locum providing services and some pastoral care under the guardianship of the Presbytery and an Interim Moderator appointed by Presbytery to work with Auchtergaven and Moneydie lw Redgorton and Stanley Churches. It also means an opportunity for the three larger Churches to share their resources with Auchtergaven and Moneydie lw Redgorton and Stanley in meaningful ways to grow the mission of the Church. I know this is a challenge and one that has left many people scratching their heads but it is the reality of the Kirk which does not have the resources it once had. For those of us in Letham it means Neil's position will drop from fulltime to 0.7 FTE. Like every other Church we accept the proposal and look at ways of building upon the proposals.

I guess from a human perspective it all seems quite depressing. This is understandable but we also have a faith perspective that opens up new possibilities especially at Easter. When we look at Holy Week, Good Friday and Resurrection Sunday we see the complete set of emotions displayed by the disciples in just 7 days. They did feel as though it was all over and that it was time to walk away. They did feel that all their efforts were in vain and they did feel that it was time to go back to their previous lives. But God had a different idea. When the disciples met the risen Saviour they were changed and transformed in their hearts, minds and souls. Their view of God had changed and their minds were now open to the possibility of turning the world upside down. Here's the good news - we have Christ and his power/love with us and there are more of us than the 11 disciples who were left.

Life can throw us some pretty difficult curve balls but we have a God who enables us to bat them back and even out the park. There is much we do not know about the Presbytery Plan and how it will work itself out but I am reminded that with God on our side "nothing is impossible." Let's go forward in faith, hope and love.

Introducing the Rev Douglas Monaghan — Familiarisation Minister from the Uniting Church of Australia

Thank you all for welcoming me into your congregation with such warmth and friendship, it has been great meeting so many of you and I look forward to getting to know you all more over the coming months.

For those who don't know me yet, I was born in Paisley (which makes me a lifelong fan of St. Mirren) and grew up in Dumfries. For a while, I was interested in studying Divinity at University, but I was worried it wouldn't lead to a suitable job (a fear I still have) so went to study Law at Dundee University. While at University, I met my wife Eunice, who was also studying law. After graduating with my law degree and Diploma in Legal Practice, I did my legal traineeship in Dumfries practicing criminal defence law. During this time, I married, then began work as a criminal defence solicitor in Stranraer where I worked for seven years. Our four children, David, Ross, and twins Euan and Megan were born during this time.

In 2001 I joined the Procurator Fiscal Service as a Procurator Fiscal Depute based in Aberdeen. After three years there, I was moved to cover the Banff office and was mainly based there with occasional excursions to Peterhead and Elgin. I had the sense that I was meant to be doing something else with my life but was not sure what. I began to think about what I could do. Ordained ministry was not an option I had in mind. To me, ministers were a strange breed and I couldn't see myself as one at all yet God continued to pester me towards this vocation. After a few years of resisting, (I made Moses look enthusiastic), I began to think about ordained ministry and the few close confidants I mentioned this to did not laugh out loud. This was confirmation enough to begin investigations with the Church of Scotland.

I had intended to go to a church enquirers conference, but the Australian government intervened at this time by offering a three year visa to go to Australia. We decided to take it up to have a bit of an adventure. After being assured the Church of Scotland would recognise the Uniting Church in Australia as a sister church, we set off for a new life in Adelaide and I began to investigate my call to ministry. After three years I was not yet ordained and had not completed my Bachelor of Ministry Degree. The church of Scotland advised that I would need to be ordained and have my degree before I could consider coming back. We extended our visa and then became citizens to allow this to happen. I was also told it would be beneficial to have some experience as a minister behind me before returning and so I began ministry there. As my children were entering the final years of High School, we decided to remain in Australia for them to finish their education and then, of course, Covid hit. My three years in Australia lasted thirteen!

I was very fortunate that the Church of Scotland allowed me to interview for a Familiarisation ministry placement over the internet and was delighted to be accepted. 121 George Street found this church as one that could take me. I am especially grateful to Rev. Jim for agreeing to take me on and supervise me. Thanks also to the team here, Rev Anne, Neil, Tracey, the Kirk Session, the volunteers, and those I've met who have all made my coming here so easy. I'm very much looking forward to getting things sorted so I can be reunited with my family who have remained in Australia while I undergo Familiarisation with the Church of Scotland.

Some Community News from our Development Worker, Neil

Hallelujah, spring is here! Good things come to those who wait. **'If we hope for what we do not see, then we do with patience wait for it' (Rom 8:25).**

Hope & Patience are great things.

I'm looking forward to helping out at Letham Primary School with some volunteers from the church as we support their Easter Holiday Lunch & Activities Club. A great opportunity to interact with the school. Please pray for God's grace, and presence, and blessing.

As a church we are also welcoming 'Love Letham', into our building between April and Christmas. Love Letham is an initiative which seeks to listen to and help young people articulate their views regarding what would make Letham the best place to grow up in. A commission will be set up which will include young people of all ages from Letham, key stakeholders within the community and council workers. The purpose of the commission is to hear young people's views and allow these views to shape future council policy and strategy for the Letham community.

More and more refugees are flooding into our area. It is really difficult for them. They could be moved on without notice any day to another place. They have no certainty or stability. They are not allowed to work or study until they receive refugee status and they cannot receive this status until they have been interviewed. They have to wait from six months to a year for an interview. Hopefully this policy will change as we welcome refugees from Ukraine at this time. I find the most engaging and interesting part of my week is spent with refugees. They are such grateful and inspiring people. If you have any free time and want to help with basic English lessons, please get in touch with Linda at ESOL Perth 07427 689797. They teach in very small groups and all materials for lessons are provided.

Every Wednesday morning in Connections Café at LSM we have started a low-key drop-in service seeking to make ourselves available to listen, pray for & signpost folks who may be struggling to stay afloat for one reason or another. Please pray for help to shape, grow, and direct this according to God's good will.

Let's be like the Good Shepherd and keep our eyes open for the lost sheep. Luke 15:4 Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Do you not leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep UNTIL YOU FIND IT?

Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields, for they are ripe already to harvest (John 4:35).


Babies and Toddlers

In January, we finished the series looking at questions from Matthew's gospel.



We are very grateful for people's prayers. People used to say that they would love to be Street Pastors but could not manage the night shift.

Now that we are out during the day and early evening we look forward to taking folk out as observers, and hopefully welcoming them as recruits!



Adam is currently in Burundi for an EMI Project Trip. He went a few days early to spend some time with the folks and projects up at Kibuye Hope Hospital.

Day 2 in Burundi - I took so many photos as I was walking around Kibuye. It was really hard to choose which one to share!

I decided on this one, because there's a lot going on here.

Looking out over these distinctive blue roofs of Kibuye, you can clearly see the new construction next to the asbestos roofs of the existing structures. A marker of the progress here at the hospital, the blue roofs now outnumber the grey ones.

We're in rainy season, and it's nice to see a building that deals well with the rains.

Its also a bonus callback to a previous photo I took here.

Back to work tomorrow!


